## **Beautiful Feet**

As we've been preparing to bring the Gospel (Good News) of Jesus as recorded in Luke this week I've been reminded of the verse below from Isaiah 52:7.

How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of the messenger who brings good news, the news of peace and salvation, the news that our God reigns

Actually, to be honest I was singing the chorus associated with these words! But as I was singing I had a thought. Why feet?

Why are they called beautiful and not the whole person bringing the good news. Even a beautiful mouth or tongue would have made more sense...but feet! I certainly don't find feet beautiful. So I did some research.

In Judaism, feet represented humility. In ancient times a slave or servant could not look at his master's face or any other part of his body except for his feet. We saw this as we acted out the Luke Drama, a prostitute washes Jesus's feet with her hair. As a sinner she instinctively felt she could not look upon Jesus, so she expressed her submission to him, like a slave or servant, by attending to his feet.

The Hebrew word used in Isaiah's passage for feet is *regal*. There are many different words for feet in Hebrew but it's important that it's this word. When you step up to the podium or onto a stage making a declaration you are stepping up with your *regal*. Literally your announcing feet. Now, when what you say is good, your feet were referred to as na'ah, which means very beautiful. If the message was bad your feet would be described as degath or ugly feet. The thinking was a bad or insulting message can only have been carried by ugly feet.

So how does this all answer my question? It seems to only make sense if Isaiah is referring to Jesus, the coming Messiah, as the messenger. If this is really a reference to Jesus, which I believe it is, then Jesus has a message of na'ah (beauty) and not degath (ugliness). When he speaks his words are good news of peace, and salvation.

When we, who are sinners, put our eyes to the feet of Jesus we will see only *na'ah regal and hear* good news. Such good news that when we accept it and make Jesus Lord and Saviour we are no longer servants and slaves with downcast eyes, but sons and daughters who see our Father's face, his smile and his everlasting love. Son's and daughters who in turn carry this wonderful good news to others, stepping out with beautiful feet.




#### **Dedication Service**

#### Read Ephesians 6:10-20

Q1. When someone attacks you verbally what is your usual way of coping? Do you run away and hide or come out fighting?

At the end of Ephesians Paul reminds us that the only response a Christian should have to the attacks of the enemy is to stand firm. This seems to counter our normal reactions of flight or fight, but God provides a way for us to do this. Paul says we should put on the full armour of God to withstand the schemes and tricks of the enemv.

- Q2. The first item of armour Paul says should be put on is the belt of truth. Why do you think truth has to be first?
- Q3. Paul then says put on the breast plate of righteousness? This item covers our hearts so it points to our relationship with God and our purity before God. How does our relationship with God protect us from the enemy? How is this connected to the belt of truth?
- Q4. Next to put on are the shoes of the Good News which bring peace and readiness? What does this mean to you. How do these shoes of peace help us stand firm.
- Q5. The shield of faith is next. How big is your shield of faith? Does it protect you from the enemy or are there some gaps he can exploit?.
- O6. Put on Salvation as your helmet. This really is about the future and all that it holds for those who are saved. What kind of future are you expecting in Christ?. How does that protect you in tough times of attack?
- Q7. Finally we have a sword. It is the sword of the spirit, the word of God. Why do you think God's word is called the sword of the Spirit. How do we use this weapon, in attack or defence?
- O6. The time of evil mentioned in verse 13 can be translated as the time of temptation. We will all face this moment many times in our lives. When was the last time you were facing 'a time of temptation'. If you were victorious what part of the armour helped you, if you were defeated what part of the armour where you not wearing correctly?

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
